

Overall, there were also a total of four spoiled ballots.

We also had the pleasure of being visited by thriller writer Sue Wallman, who talked with Years 9 and 10 about the journey to publication and the realities of being a writer, followed by a book signing afterwards. Louise Jordan, songwriter and performer also ran a spectacular musical workshop with our Years 7 and 8, all about historical inspirational women. Both year groups had previously learned parts of some of the songs in their music lessons and were able to join in for some of the performances.

We ended the week with a Literacy Festival / Aquila charity day collaboration. We held a nonuniform day for the charity Read for Good, which provides books and storytellers to children who are ill in hospital. Students had the optional opportunity to dress as a book character if they wished, and there were some spectacular costumes.

We hope that all of our students enjoyed the Literacy Festival, and are inspired to keep reading a wide range of books ahead of the event next year!








## **House Spirit Competition**
