Welcome to our final newsletter for 2023! It has been a very long autumn term and it is unusual to be in School on 22nd December. However, the timing of the end of term has added to the festive feeling along with the seasonal events of the Parents' Association Christmas Fayre, annual Christmas Concert and whole school Christmas assembly. It is always special to gather students and staff together to share on the successes of our school community. We congratulated Year 7s and new Year 12 students on completing their first term at Sutton Girls, Year 11 and 13 for successfully sitting their mock examinations and reflected on how much has been achieved since September.

Earlier this month we were delighted to be named by The Times Parent Power Survey as one of the top 30 secondary schools in the country. Based on the August 2023 GCSE and A-Level results we are 29th nationally and 4th in the West Midlands! I would like to thank and congratulate all our students and their families, staff and governors on this fantastic achievement.

The seven week half term has once again been filled with a variety of extra-curricular activities including drama rehearsals, music and mathematical competitions, interhouse sport competitions, trips to the theatre alongside all of the lessons, tutor times and assemblies. The Sixth Form open evening on 16th November was very well attended by current Year 11 students and their families along with prospective students from a variety of other schools. It was great to see so many current Sixth Form students helping in departments and sharing their experiences of the

20 different A-level subjects on offer. Information was also provided about the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), super-curricular activities, careers guidance, application advice and leadership opportunities that are all part of the sixth form experience at Sutton Girls.

Ursa held their house charity day in aid of Children in Need and the British Red Cross on Friday 17th November. There was a range of ways to donate money and participate; from the Year 7 Bake-Off, student-run stalls and games in the sports hall at lunchtime to staff karaoke, which proved very popular. In addition to raising a significant amount of money, the atmosphere throughout the day was one of positivity and respect, exemplifying the character strengths of our school.

On 21st November we hosted a meeting of the School Charity to welcome the new trustees and discuss next steps for fundraising. Please read more about our charity in this edition of the newsletter, an update will be included in every edition along with a focus on a Sutton Girls alumni.

During the half term we welcomed back last year's Year 11 for a

The Parents' Association Christmas Fayre returns!











In 2013 the School replaced the original gymnasium, changing rooms, and added new classrooms that had been part of the site since the 1930s. This would not have been possible without the generosity of the School Charity in helping to fund what is a fantastic facility for the School and wider Community.

This facility allows PE to take place every day of the year regardless of weather across a huge space that is the size of four badminton courts.



The School is able to deliver a wide range of sports in this area including badminton, trampolining, hockey, handball, football and netball. The wider community of North Birmingham also use this facility in the evening from Rugby Tots, through to netball and badminton plus School holiday clubs. The Sports Hall also allows us to have whole School assemblies under one roof as the School has grown significantly in the last decade.

away with new friends and a newfound understanding of the climate crisis and the steps we can take to mitigate it.

After having lunch in the beautiful Drawing Room, we returned to the hall for Part 2 of the conference, people wherein several who worked for Birmingham Citv Council, in order to try to make the city more sustainable, answered our questions and gave us advice on what we could do within school to take action. I found it so interesting to see all of the different careers that were available in the field of climate action, but also really inspirational to be able to see how many people were dedicating so much to help slow down the climate crisis.








Christmas Concert
